

2. AN OPEN ECO-SYSTEM FOR JUSTICE SECTOR INNOVATION

In our report [Understanding Justice Needs](#), we described a number of promising innovation trends. What happens there makes sense. Not every app built is spectacular, but the trends support fast and high quality processes for solving disputes and preventing them in the first place.

Innovative platforms have to partner with courts and local third parties. Lawyers, social workers and app-builders can merge into trusted brands for bridge-building. For this they need to meet, interact, research, buy, partner and tender. Together they should find the basis for new rules of the game.

Goal:	Enabling existing organizations to work with innovators. Partnerships and investment. Ecosystem for innovation and cooperation. Growing towards new rules of the game.
Activity	Sharing knowledge and networking. Creating partnerships, mergers, transactions.
Deliverables	Partnerships for innovation. Game-changing innovations accepted in legal systems.
Proof of concept and partners	Hiil innovation hubs in Lagos, Nairobi, Kampala. Justice innovation centres at universities. Court and bar association innovation centres. Competition and consumer protection authorities. Standard setters and certification specialists. Centre for Court Innovation. National Centre for State Courts.
Business model	Contributions in kind. Start up financing models. City government or donor funds. Membership fees. Joint programs.
First indication of resources needed	250,000 EUR per innovation hub per year (with 3-year commitment minimum). Larger hubs in the range of 375,000 EUR per year to 750,000 EUR
